#### **RECTOR'S REPORT THE REV. VICTOR H. MORGAN**

Serving as Rector of St. Luke's for 37 years gives me a unique perspective and advantage. As I look back, I can see God's hand at work in the life of this congregation at every turn in its history. I can only say with the psalmist: "This is the Lord's doing; it is marvellous in our eyes" (118:33).

The story has been told many times before, but God had prepared a place for a parish church over 20 years before there was any talk of building one. David H. Haight, Sr., a Canadian by birth and an Anglican by faith, died in 1968 while on a hunting trip. In his will, the parcel of ground on which the church now stands was earmarked for "a church of the Protestant faith." His widow, Willa Mae Haight, herself a stalwart Baptist, signed over the lots to the Wardens and Vestry of St. Luke's Church in 1987 a few weeks after the fledging congregation had been formed.

God has continued to bless and provide for the needs of St. Luke's down to this present day. This past year has been an exciting one. One of the high points has been re-establishing the choir following the Covid pandemic. Many thanks to Diana Burden and Randy Wilbur for all they have done and are doing in the area of music.

We are also fortunate to have two stellar people serving as Wardens. Senior Warden Jim Noblett assumed this role after Pat Dearing stepped down after he and his wife Sherron decided to relocate to Marrietta. There is not enough paper to record the many contributions Pat made to this church over several decades. Happily, Pat and Sherron remain a part of the worshiping community of St. Luke's attending online.

No Senior Warden was better prepared than Mr. Noblett. During the Covid pandemic while serving as Junior Warden, he proved himself week after week being God's man of the hour. The Rector would conceive an idea of how to keep the worshipping life of the community going: he with his technical and practical know-how would make it happen.

Mrs. Higdon, meanwhile, assumed the position of Junior Warden after Mr.

Noblett's 'ascension'. She has already proved herself to be a capable leader. No detail of the building or grounds escapes her eye.

As we look forward, I think I should say that whether it is maintaining a high standard of music or the preservation and upkeep of our iconic building, the larger focus must be on the promulgation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Music and edifices are tools and means.

In many ways, St. Luke's is unique in North Georgia. In a religious market (and that is what it has become), St. Luke's has not succumbed to the zeitgeist of the age, pursuing relevance by holding onto the tail of the dog of culture. Whereas in many places entertainment and me-centered worship experiences has replaced encounter with the awesome God of creation and redemption, St. Luke's has doggedly maintained worship that is Biblical and relevant, ancient and ever modern.

We maintain a gracious orthodoxy nourished and grounded in the inspired scriptures and turned into prayer and worship in the Book of Common Prayer. Sunday by Sunday those who attend either in person or online hear the wonderful words of God in their own language (the language of the soul), clean, thunderous and salty. With these ringing in their ears, they go forth to be about their Father's business.

More than that, St. Luke's as the parish church is a community center. Our building is open daily for those seeking a place of quiet refuge from the storms of life. Support groups gather here throughout the week. Concerts and other events are held. We are not a members-only operation. Our doors are open to all.

In short, there is no place like St. Luke's in these parts, and here is what you can do. Let others know there is a place where they can worship the living God in beauty and holiness, a place where both mind and heart are engaged, a place where love and kindness is practiced, a place for all sorts, a place of growth and transformation, a place that points to heaven's gate.

With the lofty vision I have just shared, practically I would like us to:

- Improve our signage to the church.
- Produce some videos for the Internet introducing the church, perhaps including short clips of members of St. Luke's sharing their journey to the church.
- Explore ways to attract those visiting the area to tour the church throughout the week.
- Expand opportunities for equipping members for explaining and sharing the Christian faith.

Thank you for your faithfulness. St. Luke's is truly a team effort. All hands are needed on board. With St. Paul we say: *"forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus"* (Philippians 3:13,14).

Our members participated in winter and fall Bible studies. Our winter study took us through the book of Acts and in the fall, we studied the book of Philippians. Both were very enlightening studies. Our thanks to Judy Brooten, Darlene Dunnigan and Teresa Wankel for facilitating the sessions. Music-wise St. Luke's had a very good year. The choir resumed in June with seven core members New members are being aggressively sought. At the moment, the choir sings once a month. St. Luke's is very fortunate to have stellar organist Steve Cagle playing two or three times a month, along with the capable assistance and direction of Randy Wilbur (who knows everyone in the musical world of North Georgia). A key triumph in 2023 was a Choral Evensong on St. Luke's Day.

The Music Committee has begun work on drawing up a schedule of concerts for 2024. Already on the calendar for 2024 is a Blue Ridge Chamber Music concert featuring Lissa Knight, pianist; Maggie Flavin, woodwinds and Jana Young, soloist.
