RECTOR'S REPORT: REV. VICTOR H. MORGAN

June 2022 marked the 35th anniversary of St. Luke's Church. It has been my joy and privilege to serve as your rector during these years. I continue to give thanks that the Lord has called me to labor in this parish. Each year has brought new blessings and opportunities; 2022 has been no exception. As the year began, a major goal was to continue to perfect our broadcasting capabilities. With a significant contribution from a donor combined with the technical expertise of Jim Noblett, that goal has been met. As of Jan. 4, 2023, St. Luke's has 72 subscribers to its YouTube channel and 393 Facebook followers. On average, around 50 people view some of our Sunday videos. Some of these support us financially. Before I pass on from this subject, I want to thank Mr. Noblett for his contribution to the success of this endeavor. Since the beginning of the Covid pandemic at the beginning of 2020, he has been God's man of the hour. I would also like to thank those who volunteer to run the video booth in the back of the church each Sunday: Priscilla McDonald, Jennifer Higdon and Bob Bradley. If you would like to be a part of this ministry, please speak to me or Mr. Noblett.

One challenge which presented itself in 2022 was the decline in health and subsequent death of St. Luke's organist Eileen Avery Kerr. Mrs. Kerr was a part of the music ministry of this church for over 30 years and will forever be remembered for her high expectations for members of the St. Luke's choir (her 'victims', as they were sometimes called). Preparations are currently underway for a marble memorial plaque to be placed on the wall behind the organ console. May she rest in peace and rise in glory!

On a positive note, St. Luke's is blessed to have Diana Burden serving as Parish Musician. Mrs. Burden and her mother Marcia Semenak came to us from the Lutheran church during the Covid pandemic, and we are truly blessed by their faithful presence. St. Luke's has also been fortunate to secure the services of Steven Cagle, a world-class organist. We look forward to Mr. Cagle playing for one or more services a month in 2023. I would be remiss if I dd not recognize those who donned choir robes and provided music for the late-night Christmas Eve service. These included: Frank Rule, Marcia Semenak, Brooke McHan, Andy Lebkuecher, Teresa Wankel, Pat Dearing, Deacon W.A. "Tony" McConnell and the Rev. Ronald O. Wikander. I invite and encourage anyone who would like to be a part of the music ministry of St. Luke's to speak to Mrs. Burden.

Since 2018, Al Cash has served as Senior Warden. He took over at a turbulent time and has led with a steady hand. His term is expiring, and I know you join me in thanking him for his service. I am happy to announce that Pat Dearing has accepted my invitation to succeed Dr. Cash. Brought

up in a clergyman's household in Florida and having served previous terms on the Vestry, Mr. Dearing brings great wisdom and experience to this office.

Where do we want to go in 2023? Well, to be sure God's way. We live in a day when three institutions which bind society together and promote human flourishing -- government, school, and church - are under attack and seem to be coming apart. A dark cloud has descended over the face of Western Civilization. At such a time as this, St. Luke's calling, as I see it, is to stand as a beacon of light. Here, the ancient faith is preserved and proclaimed. Here, beauty and truth are esteemed and celebrated. Here, Sunday by Sunday, Christ is announced; hope renewed; soldiers equipped and sent out. A new world, but the same St. Luke's! Our task is not just to hunker down in our own little cocoon of safety and peace, but to embody all that is lovely and true - the Gospel itself -- and to take it out wherever people are hurting and in need. Let's look for new ways to do that in 2023.

As I close, I wish to express my gratitude to all who make it possible for light to go forth from this place. Special thanks to Teresa Wankel for her leadership with the Women of St. Luke's; Neil McDonald who does a superb job in directing the St. Luke's Men's Group, John Johnson who keeps our physical plant and grounds neat and appealing; to members of the Altar Guild who do a vital work, most of which is out of sight; for Deacon McConnell, Verger Noblett and those who serve as servers and readers, including our young leaders: Finn and Elin Thoreson and 'Deacon' Reed Ferrell. Finally, special thanks to St. Luke's unflappable and always cheerful administrative assistant and my boss, Kathryn Noblett. Her efficiency makes my ministry possible and pleasurable.

- Our annual church events were quite successful they include:

- There will be 2 openings on the Vestry this year.
 - The Senior Warden's (Al Cash) term will expire in January 2023 and has reached the 3-year limitation on terms of service. Per the Canon, the Rector appoints the new Senior Warden. We are extremely happy with Father Morgan's appointment of Pat Dearing as the new Senior Warden.
 - The Junior Warden's (Jim Noblett) term will also expire in January 2023. The protocol for filling that position is a recommendation from the Vestry with further nominations (if any) followed by a vote from the congregation.

- Positions at-large are filled by the Vestry, therefore, any additional openings that occur through the year will be handled within the Vestry guidelines.
- We acknowledge and salute our secretary this past year the wonderfully pleasant and capable Kathryn Noblett. Thank you, Kathryn, for all the great work you do.
- As 2023 unfolds there will be much work and continued planning in furtherance of our Lord's work, and specifically for St. Luke's. Let us remember these words from Jeremiah Chapter 29, Verse 11; "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT: JIM NOBLETT

Report for 2022

In 2022 God blessed St. Luke's church with another great year. Church services are now back to normal, and we are continuing online services as well. We did have quite a few activities and projects outside of our normal day-to-day operations. They are as follows:

- We hired a dedicated housekeeper (Betty Gray) for the church and parish house. She has and continues to do a wonderful job.
- Gordon Bailey and I rewired the driveway lights with a new transformer wired to the time clock that automates the lights operation. Many thanks to Gordon for his expert assistance in this and all the other projects he has been involved in.
- The suspended ceilings in the Narthex bathrooms were replaced.
- The annual Spring cleanup was completed by the SLMG. We had our Parish Easter Egg hunt for the first time in 2 years, was well attended. The SLMG and Kiwanis were instrumental in preparing the grounds and eggs for the hunt.
- The parish house roof was in bad shape, so we had the roof replaced this year.
- The ongoing project to modernize our sound system continued as we moved the organ woofer from the sound booth at the back of the church to the closet next to the sound booth. Thanks to Neil McDonald for modifying the door with acoustic cloth to allow the sound to be heard throughout the whole church.
- The pavilion was dedicated to Richard Misinco, which necessitated the pavilion being deep cleaned as well as new cabinets being installed under the counters.
- We also repurposed the old church sign as a façade sign for the pavilion.
- The parish house is the site of many remodeling activities. The WSL and SLMG have agreed to remodel the interior of the parish house, particularly

the kitchen and bathroom. We want the parish house to reflect a professional and businesslike image. The first activity completed was the replacement of the old electrical fuse panel with a new and updated breaker panel. The guest bathroom has been demolished and we are in the process of rebuilding it to be followed by the kitchen.

• At the end of the year, one of the furnaces that serve the Nave was discovered to have a defective heat exchanger, and it was replaced in December.

I wish to again thank the WSL and SLMG for their help and support in 2022. With their help and God's blessings we will have a wonderful 2023.

The Women of St Luke's are very active in the life here at St Luke's Church and in the extended community. We serve on the Altar Guild and as ushers, Acolytes, Lay Readers, and Vestry members. We are members of Fellowship and Outreach, Education and Memorial Garden committees. Several of our group also volunteer at the local Food Pantry and are involved at Feed Fannin and with Toys for Tots.

This year we planned and participated in fund raising events including our annual Yard Sale and our annual Christmas Bazaar. Both were remarkable successes. Proceeds from these events fund our outreach programs. For 2022 these included Fannin County Family Connection, Feed Fannin, Good Samaritan Fund, Her Hope Pregnancy Center in Blue Ridge, Immanuel Church, Safe Choice Pregnancy Center in Ellijay, Snack-in-a-Backpack, Sunny D Children's Theater Camp and the Women's Enrichment Center in Blairsville. Proceeds from these events are also set aside in our Benevolence Fund which is used to assist St Luke's parishioners and the extended community as needs arise.

In addition to the above, members of the WSL participated in the Walk for Life, a fund raiser for Her Hope Pregnancy Center in Blue Ridge. The total raised by St Luke's was \$1730.00. In June, we hosted the ladies of North Court apartments at a Spring Tea. Our annual Wine and Cheese/Toys for Tots social in October garnered a box full of toys as well as financial donations for Toys for Tots. In early December, members of the WSL gathered at the home of Diane Wikander for the WSL Ladies Christmas luncheon. We finished the month with

a coffee for the residents of the North Court apartments where we distributed gift bags.

In November of this year, we applied to form a chapter of the Daughters of the Holy Cross. This order of women is committed to making disciples and serving Jesus through their Rule of Life: prayer, service, study and evangelism. Please contact Judy Brooten for more information.

With a busy end of year calendar, we always look forward to winter and our winter Bible study. This provides a respite from the busyness of the holiday season and is a wonderful way to begin the new year. Last year we had a wonderful study on Prayer. Our thanks to Judy Brooten, Jodi Beauregard, and Teresa Wankel for facilitating the sessions. This year's Bible study will be on the book of Acts. We invite all women to join this active and vibrant group in our mission to serve Christ, our Church, and our community.

The WSL meets every other month on the second Wednesday at 9:30 a.m. in the Yellow Room and via Zoom.

St. Luke's Safety/Security Committee 2022 Annual Report NEIL MCDONALD

Our Safety/Security Committee members are Sr. Warden Al Cash, Junior Warden Jim Noblett, Rev. Ron Wikander, Deacon Tony McConnell, Roseanne Johnston, Pat Dearing, Bob Bradley, and Chairman, Neil McDonald.

Details about the *Safety/Security Committee's* role and purpose as described in our *Strategic Plan* which is accessible through the church website member section--stlukesblueridge.org.

A significant accomplishment this year was to review our general liability and worker's compensation insurance coverage through *Church Mutual Insurance Company*. We recommended that our Vestry seek comparable coverage options.

Subsequently, effective in June, we secured improved coverage options and reduced premium costs through the local Kevin Panter Insurance Agency with *Southern Mutual Church Insurance Company*.

Our fire extinguishers, and emergency equipment are in compliance. Roseanne Johnston who monitors our emergency first aid equipment was notified about a manufacturer's recall for one of our AED's. We have confirmed that both of our AED's are in compliance.

This year we improved the audio/videotaping and security monitoring station (rear of the sanctuary) and obtained two swivel chairs for operator comfort. We also mounted one AED and a first aid box there. A second AED and first aid kit are located downstairs in Thomason Hall.

We recognized the need to improve the zooming capability of an exterior security camera, and to install another one inside the Narthex. This equipment has Vestry approval and has been ordered through ETC Security. Installation is scheduled in January 2023. We have also ordered new permanent security signs which will be mounted at entrance doors as replacements for the old ones.

Our committee is concerned for the need to diligently protect us. However, as a reminder to all of us the responsibility for personal safety and security at St. Luke's belongs to all of us. Should you become aware of anything of concern, please let us know as soon as possible.

In closing, we acknowledge throughout 2022 our Lord has protected and blessed us once again with a safe and secure place of worship here at St. Luke's. Thanks be to God!

EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT: PAT DEARING

Annual Report of the Education Committee, 2022

Teaching Tuesday's classes focus on teaching the principles and beliefs of the Christian faith. This may include studying the Bible and other religious texts, learning about the history and traditions of Christianity, and developing a personal relationship with God, and is designed for students of all ages. The goal of Christian education is to help students grow in their faith and understand the teachings of Christianity, and to provide them with the knowledge and skills they need to live a fulfilling and meaningful life as a follower of Christ.

Over the past year as we gradually emerged from COVID restrictions, we were able to resume our normal Teaching Tuesday's classes with Fr. Morgan, Fr. Ron, Claudia Pound, Judy Bruton, D. J. Fulton, and Pat Dearing as our presenters. (We miss Teresa and her spirited presentations but understand that her plate overfloweth.) We studied Bishop Tom Wright's Books and videos on Simply Christian and Paul for Everyone: Romans; Hillsdale College's online video course on The Genesis Story: Reading the Biblical Narrative; and a roundtable discussion on Martin Luther's tract, The freedom of the Christian and his effect on one of the greatest changes in the Christian religion.

The 2023 schedule has not been set, but we will probably be using more of Hillsdale College's online video courses, Tom Wright's video courses, and possibly another roundtable book study.

We are in need of additional presenters. I have tried to make classes less burdensome for our presenters by using more online and videothemed classes, as well as book studies. If you are interested in becoming part of our training cadre, please talk to Fr. Morgan or Pat Dearing. Anyone who is interested is warmly welcome to our group.

CONCERT COMMITTEE REPORT: REV. VICTOR H. MORGAN



The committee's mission is to enrich the life of the Parish Church of St. Luke and the broader North Georgia community through the promotion of music to the glory of God.

Current members of the committee include the Rev. Victor H. Morgan, A.D. Frazier, Carlos Martel, Lissa Knight, Kathryn Noblett, Diana Burden and Tim and Jennifer Higdon. Victor Morgan and Carlos Martel serve as co-chairs.

Four events were held in 2022 including: a piano concert by Oral Moses entitled 'The Soul and Spirit of America' in July. In August, we hosted Kevin Garland with a concert entitled 'Perseverance'.
